1) Town Center Property and Ballfield

Located behind the Town Office on Rt. 32. Gentle hill for sledding and mowed ballfield for walking.

2) Storer Road Landing

At the end of the Storer Road is a tidal boat ramp for small boats or kayaks with access to Broad Cove. Often used by fishermen and clamdiggers. Small parking lot is available. Great place to walk along the shore, have a picnic on the rocks, or swim. Owned by the Town of Bremen.



3) Hay Conservation And Recreation Center

Located on Route 32 just north of Turner Road. Small parking lot on top of property. Foot trail and gravel road downhill to the water approximately 1/4 mile. Small ramp to launch kayak or canoe. Benches to enjoy beautiful view of the water. Owned and maintained by the Town of Bremen.

4) Heath Road Bridge

Located midway on Heath Road. There is parking for one car. View of salt water marsh and lovely walk on quiet road.

5) Bremen Town Forest

A 47-acre Town Forest and Hilton O'Connor Trail located on Rt. 32 next to the fire station. This well-maintained, 1.5-mile hiking trail traverses a landscape replete with stone walls, saltwater marshes, freshwater creeks, old and new growth forests, and flora and fauna unique to mid-coast Maine. Owned by the Town of Bremen and maintained in cooperation with Coastal Rivers Conservation Trust.

6) Hillside Trail

Located on Route 32 above the Hillside Cemetery. Drive to the top of the cemetery to park. The trail is on an old logging road approximately mile owned by the Town of Bremen. Trail is rustic and wet but scheduled for improvement.



7) Wild Lily Preserve

This 125-acre preserve with over 1,000' of pond frontage was recently gifted to Coastal Rivers Land Trust by the Cohen and Bercow families. Trails through this beautiful and diverse forest will be developed soon — check Coastal Rivers website for more information.

8) Pemaguid Pond Preserve

Maintained and owned by the Coastal Rivers Conservation Trust, the Pemaquid Pond Preserve consists of 196 acre on the mainland as well as a 1.9-acre island. This gentle woodland walk of 1/4 mile to the shoreline, boasts broad vistas, rocky outcropings, and wooded shores. Along the shoreline are prime examples of native vegetation that prevents erosion and protects the health of the pond. Please do not go onto the island. mid-May to mid-July. Located on Turner Road 1.8 miles from Biscay Road or 1.7 miles from Rt. 32.

9) McCurdy Islands Preserve

Located on McCurdy Pond on Turner Road. There are no trails on the 11.5 acre preserve, so best to enjoy by canoe or kayak. The best place to launch is on the far right of the causeway on the right coming from Biscay Road. There is a small pullout on the far right. Landing on the island is discouraged to protect its wild state and wildlife. Maintained and owned by Coastal Rivers Conservation Trust.

10) Weston Memorial Spring

The Weston Memorial Spring is sealed and water is not potable. Access is difficult from Fogler Road or boat from Biscay Pond.

11) Bremen Town Landing Town Dock & Parking Area

Located at the end of Town Landing Road directly off Medomak Road. Ample parking but no boat launching availability. Could carry a canoe or kayak to the end of the dock or with some difficulty launch from shore. No facilities.

12) Creek Road Landing

At the end of the Creek Road off the Medomak Road; there is a parking area on the left for two cars. The access goes from this area down to the water by a rough path approximately 100 feet. Tidal Entry.

13) Clam Island

Located almost directly across from the Bremen Town Landing and clearly visible. There is a loop trail through fields of ferns and woods, approximately 1/2 mile, that can be accessed at both southern and northern ends of the island. Trailheads are marked with orange triangles and can be seen from the water. Access by small boats only. There is no designated landing area, but a stone beach at the southern end, a mud bottom cove on the eastern side (at low tide all mud) and a stone beach on the northwestern end are suitable for landing. No fires and day use only. Owned by the Town of Bremen and maintained by Friends of Clam Island.

14) Bremen Long Island Mid-Island Town Landing

Located east of the Town Landing Dock. Located next to a privately owned dock and connects to the island road. It is not marked.

15) Karl F. Berger Preserve

The preserve features a rich undeveloped forest and half a mile of beautiful shoreline, including several pebble beaches and tidal pools.

The Karl F. Berger Preserve is accessible by canoe or kayak. Orange triangular reflectors designate the trailhead and can be seen from the water. The trip from the Bremen town landing to the preserve is approximately ¾ mile. Maintained by Mid Coast Conservancy.

The two mile (round trip) trail passes rocky ledges and mossy forest streams, through pristine red spruce/white pine forest, to the beaches, tidepools and eel grass beds.

16) Bremen Long Island Southern End Landing

Located on very southern tip of the island but inside a sheltered cove. The road on the island connects this landing to the Bremen Long Island Mid-Island Landing. It is not marked.

17) Greenland Cove Mill Pond Access

Located about 1/8 mile down Keene Neck Road on the right. Not marked, but there is a 1-2 car parking area next to a natural entry to the tidal Mill Pond.

Bremen Conservation Commission

The Commission stewards the public lands of Bremen. This includes working to protect fragile ecosystems and promoting public access to our trails and waterfronts. Our mission is to conserve undeveloped land in Bremen that will protect its water resources, preserve wildlife habitat and to maintain the rural character of the town. We accomplish this by working with town residents, conservation organizations, government agencies and educa-

18) Todd Wildlife Sanctuary

This 30-acre property is located at the end of Keene Neck Road. Visitors are welcome on foot from dawn to dusk. There is NO public boat launch from the mainland property. Leashed dogs are welcome. Please clean up all trash and pet waste.

Hockomock Point Trail (1 mile) is a moderate walk. The trail becomes narrow at times and includes uneven terrain.

Pine Tree Trail (.5 mile) is an easy walk winding through hardwood forest.

Meadow Trail (.5 mile) is a gentle walk that reveals an abundance of milkweed - a host plant for endangered monarch butterflies - as well as insect life and meadow plants.

Pond Spur Trail (.1 mile) is less than a quarter mile in length. It connects Audubon Road with the Pine Tree Trail.



19) Todd Wildlife Sanctuary at Hog Island

A 330-acre property, Hog Island is located a quarter mile offshore and home to Hog Island Audubon Camp. Visitors on foot are welcome dawn to dusk, year-round. Pets are not permitted on Hog Island.

The Hog Island trail network is open to the public; however, there is NO public boat launch from the Todd Wildlife Sanctuary mainland property. Visitor moorings are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Trails range from .3 miles to the perimeter trail of 5 miles.
